Subject: NATIONAL ACTION PLAN AGAINST SORCERY AND WITHCRAFT RELATED VIOLENCE

On 16th July 2015, Council:

1. noted the content of Policy Submission No. 92/2015;

- 2. noted the compelling need to address the issue of sorcery and witchcraft accusation related violence in Papua New Guinea;
- endorsed the National Action Plan (attached) against Sorcery and Witchcraft Related Violence as a practicable mechanism through which Sorcery and Witchcraft related violence is to be addressed;
- endorsed the establishment of a National Committee and Provincial Committees (attached) to oversee the implementation of the National Action Plan against Sorcery and Witchcraft related violence in the country; and
- approved to direct the Secretary for the Department of Treasury to make available in the 2016 Budget K3 million for the implementation of the National Action Plan against Sorcery and Witchcraft related violence.

# Sorcery and Witchcraft Accusation Related Violence - National Action Plan

### Vision

PNG society is free from sorcery and witchcraft related violence through strengthened partnerships between relevant stakeholders.

## Mission

- To stop accusations leading to sorcery related violence
- To deal effectively with the perpetrators of violence.
- To address the needs of survivors and to restore security to the communities, within the legal policy frameworks and acceptable values and norms.

# Background

led to this present draft national action plan to provide a concrete foundation for the holistic response. problems cannot be solved solely at a legislative level, and must rather involve a holistic response. This recognition led to a national conversation that has in the Criminal Code Act 1974 (Chapter 262). However, there is growing recognition, both within the government and the wider community that these attention to the problem of sorcery and witchcraft accusation-related violence. In the face of mounting pressure to take action, including the national haus krai protest calling for an end to violence against women, the PNG Government responded by repealing the Sorcery Act 1971 and creating a new provision In 2013, widespread publicity given to the deaths of two women accused of witchcraft in Papua New Guinea (PNG) drew international and national



#### Reporting Structure of Sorcery National Action Plan (SNAP)



The Sorcery National Action Plan (SNAP) will be coordinated by a core committee co-chaired by the Department of Justice & Attorney General (DJAG) and the Consultative Implementation & Monitoring Council (CIMC) and implemented by a sectoral committee, which will coordinate the five elements of the SNAP: 1) Care & Counseling, 2) Advocacy & Communications, 3) Legal & Protection, 4) Health sector, and 5) Research. An advisory committee will provide technical advice.

#### **SNAP Core Committee members:**

DJAG (Co-Chair), CIMC (Co-Chair), Department of Community Development (DFCD), Royal PNG Constabulary (Police), National Department of Health, Public Solicitor's office, Village Courts Secretariat, Public Prosecutor's Office, Magisterial Services, Department of national Planning and National Research Institute.

The Core Committee will report to the Secretary of the Department of Justice & Attorney General through the Human Rights Forum, and to the Secretary of the Department of Community Development through the Gender Forum.
